### **Girls Track Speeding Past Opponents**

The Seals girls track team has been the biggest headline so far in the Selinsgrove spring sport season. With a dual meet team record of 3-0, the Seals are poised for another outstanding season on the track and field where they are shaping to be favorites to repeat as District IV and Heartland Conference champions.

Selinsgrove's multitude of talent was very evident during the Selinsgrove Classic, held at Selinsgrove's Harold L. Bolig Memorial Stadium. Leading the way for the Seals was junior Sara Arbogast. Arbogast finished the invitational with 1<sup>st</sup> place finishes in the 400 m dash (1:01) and the triple jump (33 feet, 8 inches).

In the last event of the day, Arbogast anchored the 4 by 400 meter relay team that would go on to set a Selinsgrove Classic invitational record with a time of 4:14. For Arbogast, it was her third gold medal of the day, while Anna Piecuch, Briana Brown, and Megan Hoffman each also picked up gold medals for their performance on the relay team.

"It was really a great day for me but really the team as a whole. I think the work that we put in during the indoor season has really paid off for a lot of us and I couldn't be more excited for where we are headed," said Arbogast after the

In the sprints, freshman Megan Hoffman displayed her highly touted speed with a 1<sup>st</sup> place finish in the 200 m dash with a time of 26.70 seconds and a 2<sup>nd</sup> place finish in the 100 m dash with a time of 13.14 seconds. Hoffman, who started for the field hockey team as a freshman this fall, has been generating a lot of buzz in the area for her fast feet.

"Megan (Hoffman) really is unbelievable. She is going to be a great field hockey player but she might have more potential on the track. She's such a great athlete and I am so excited she decided to join the team this year," commented junior Sara Arbogast.

Junior Ashley Blair would notch Selinsgrove's fourth gold medal of the day, winning the 1600 m run with a time of 5:23. Senior Honoria Krause took home 1<sup>st</sup> in the shot put with a throw of 32 feet, 6 inches, completing a total of five gold medals for the Seals on the day.

Other notable performances on the day included a third place finish by senior Morgan Zeager in the shot put with a throw of 31 feet, 5 inches. Sophomore Brittney Carnathan took home 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the 800 m run with a time of 2:28. Finally, junior Natalie Brown finished her day with a 3<sup>rd</sup> place finish in the 100 dash (13.39 seconds) and a 4<sup>th</sup> place finish in the 200 m dash (28.11).

With much of the season still in the distance, Selinsgrove will continue to be a strong contender throughout the league and district; however, no single meet will matter as much as the one being run today at the Selinsgrove High School stadium because the Lady Seals will take on their most bitter rival of the season – Shikellamy. The meet starts at 4pm with the winner likely to be the league champion.

### A Few Shines at Selinsgrove Classic

While the Selinsgrove boys track and field team has gotten off to a sluggish 1-2 record in dual meets, the Seals were still able to come away with several impressive performances at the annual Selinsgrove Classic invitational.

Senior standout Jacob Strickler led the way, taking home four medals. Strickler placed 1<sup>st</sup> in the Shot Put throw with a distance of 50 feet, 7 inches. Senior Jack Gaugler and sophomore Keith Dreese took 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> respectively in the shot put, each throwing for over 48 feet

Strickler would not be the only Selinsgrove athlete to take home a gold in the field events. Freshman Brennen Wolf took 1<sup>st</sup> in the discus throw with a distance of 146 feet. Dreese and Strickler would finish just behind him, taking home silver and bronze medals for the Seals

On the track, senior standout and team captain Brody Beiler led the way for the Seals. Beiler finished the day with two silver medals: one coming in the 800 m dash with a time of 2:05, and the other coming in the 1600 m run, where he finished with a time of 4:23.

In the sprinting events, Juvon Batts finished the day with a 3<sup>rd</sup> place finish in the 100 m dash (11.67 seconds) and a 4<sup>th</sup> place finish in the 200 m dash (24.18 seconds).

While many eyes were on the track for the running events, sophomore Garrett Wolf opened some eyes as well, taking home a silver medal in the pole vault with a height of 12 feet, 6 inches.

"Overall, I think we were pretty pleased for how we competed as a team. A lot of guys are coming off of winter sports and are still trying to find their groove. I think you'll see a team that will only get better moving forward", said team captain Brody Beiler.



I would often play house on my swing set, dubbing these games "old fashioned"- I became a young girl from the 1800s making up intricate stories

about life without modern
conveniences.

grove. She was recently told that a girl her age (nine) should go play with dolls instead of reporting the news. To that she responded that she didn't need to go and play with dolls.

Some children are ready to end this sort of imaginative play at an earlier age than others and use their creativity in new ways. Hilde is clearly one of those kids, which, of course, is absolutely fine. However, the message that this exchange sent was that playing with dolls is something that isn't important and is merely an activity that little girls do that is sweet and fun.

Playing with dolls is nothing like that. When children play with dolls they are creating a scene in their head, taking on a different persona, and using their imagination to make up the character of their doll; ultimately through this pretend play they are figuring out ways to imitate and adapt to the real world.

This imaginative play creates a sense of empathy, trust, love, humor, respect, and it is an extremely important way to use one's imagination. As for it being sexist, that's an issue for another article. And for the record, every boy should play with dolls too. My mother walked all over Boston until she found a boy doll for my older brother when he was a little kid (why she couldn't just buy a girl doll could also be a subject for another day).

Of course, Hilde and her parents know what is best for her, but lets not discount the value of imaginative play with dolls—or trucks or blocks. Children begin imaginative play when they

are 18 to 24
months old.
They imitate
the basic daily
actions they
see the adults
around them
do - using
keys to unlock
a car, talking
on the phone,
or putting on
shoes.

This is just another way for children to learn to participate in the world they were born into. In that respect, it is not much different from toddlers beginning to talk, eat,

and sleep. Those are physical adaptations while using their imagination is a social adaptation. And this social experimentation works.

Children who exercise their imagination during their childhood are more creative, better at understanding the social inclinations of others, and have an easier time seeing the perspective of others. The ways in which we use our imagination as a very young child develop into the ways we are able to use our imagination when we grow older.

We as humans will use our imagination throughout our entire lives. Starting through play is possibly the first and most important step in learning to use our imagination. And yes, we all grow at different rates, but it is good to keep in mind the significance of imaginative plays and the wonders it has brought to many children.
